Harbor clean-up

Educate to Eliminate (E2E) – Wellington Harbour clean-up



For a number of years WUC members have joined scores of other divers to help in the annual clean-up in the harbour. The event is sponsored by WCC, and the mayor who is a diver gets involved as well.

It's usually near Taranaki wharf (location yet to be confirmed). There are diving and topside opportunities to help. You can join a dive or shoreline clean-up team.

There is another team who wash the retrieved debris, such as bottles and cans, to save any marine critters that are brought to the surface. This marine life often finds its way to the Island Bay aquarium or is simply returned to the sea.

We've also done a clean-up at the Kumutoto stream recently.







Last year a small group of divers gathered at Kilbirnie pool for the sidemount experience.

Chris Clark from Dive Wellington brought all the equipment including tanks & harnesses for us to try out. Instead of the normal inflatable jacket which holds your tank, for sidemount you wear a close fitting harness which has a small capacity for inflation and then hang a tank on clips on the harness either side of you.

I expected to sink like a stone with two tanks and minimal inflation but I actually had trouble staying down as it was a bit tricky dumping the air.

We swam around in the pool practicing unhooking the tanks and moving them forward as you might need to do in a confined space.

Chris generally dives with a sidemount setup although it is more commonly used in cave diving.


It was easy enough to use the equipment and without a tank on my back it gave me an unexpected free feeling in the water.

If you get the opportunity I recommend giving sidemount a try.

Elsdon Pipeline shore dive

This was a 75 minute dive, from south to north around the Elsdon Pipeline rocks. Mike, Rob E, Sophie and Nicole were on this dive. It was a calm and sunny day, no surge and the visibility was as good as it gets. South coast at its best - an epic dive.

South coast shore dive

Another great dive from out in front of Dive Wellington shop. It was a calm and sunny day, preceded by a week of offshore winds which meant the conditions on the south coast were really good.

It was a large groupd of WUC members, with Rob Wilson as the guide. We went left (northeast) and Rob led us through swim-throughs and across a pebbly and sandy bottom. Lots to see, including an octopus, schooling fish, nudibranchs and of course crays and anemone.

Snorkel Trail - night dive

A group of Club members did a night dive starting at 6:45pm (in March) at the Island Bay Snorkel Trail in the Marine Reserve. Excellent viz and lots of wandering anemones.

What Wellington Underwater Club has achieved in 2015

Range of dive activities. We have a broad range of activities available to WUC members, including:

- Technical diving
- Marine archaeology and marine conservation
- Recreational diving
- Underwater photography
- We are also currently investigating the purchase of two scooters for use by Club members.

Summary of the Club activities for the past year:

- **Club Dives** ten organised Club dives, mostly shore dives. Includes a dive on F69 and an after work dive. Also a dive weekend in Northland. The Club ran four pool sessions at Kilbirnie pool.
- **Technical diving** GUE Scooter, gasblender and documentation diver courses as well as a cavern and cave dive weekend at the Poor Knights. Attendance at the Taupo TecFest weekend. We also have an active group of divers with rebreathers.

Annual fixtures –

- o WUC had a strong showing at the 24 hour dive run as a fundraiser for the Coast Guard.
- Teams of WUC members took part in a harbour clean-up Educate to Eliminate (run by the Wellington Harbour Clean Up group).

Maritime Archaeology –

- Last August we ran an Australasian Institute of Maritime Archaeology (AIMA) course organised. Sixteen people attended, four from Auckland.
- WUC has club membership of Maritime Archaeological Association of NZ (MAANZ. WUC members regularly attend the monthly MAANZ meetings.
- We are hoping to make progress on some archaeology projects with MAANZ to utilise the AIMA training.
- **Social** the most popular activities have been a breakfast or brunch together with a Club dive. We had six of these during the year.

Marine Conservation advocacy –

- The Club supported other local marine interest groups, including Taputeranga Marine Reserve Trust, and made two submissions to Council, backed up with verbal presentations. These submissions by multiple advocacy groups have had some success i.e. WCC's recently released Biodiversity Plan now recognises Wellington's 'magnificent harbour and coastline' and refers to the coastal 'blue belt' including a list of actions that are needed to enhance the coastal and marine environment.
- The Club also made a Resource Consent submission on the Reena wreck, along with other dive clubs. WUC is on the watch list for the Consent process.
- Website and facebook page are maintained.
- NZUA AGM in Tauranga was attended by a WUC 26-28 June 2015.
- Dive shop discounts discounts are available at two dive shops for tank fills on Club dives.

NZUA's Trash2Cash 2015 Dive against Debris in September

In September this year NZUA (NZ Underwater Association) will be encouraging all dive clubs, shops, groups, workplaces, and organisations to get on board the <u>Dive against Debris</u> campaign being run by <u>Project Aware</u>.

NZUA will be helping groups facilitate their own Dive against Debris, in which teams collect and record debris picked up off the ocean floor. All data is uploaded to a World Map which logs every dives location, as well as the breakdown in types of debris collected! It is a really fantastic resource, and not only a great way to help the environment - but also a way to participate in the only world-wide scientific research being conducted in which members of the general public can contribute!
